Washing instructions for “Chani”

Materials used

Fabric: 100% cotton outer and batting.

Print: permanent and colorfast non-toxic textile paint.

Care instructions

- Gentle spot clean with mild soap. Machine washing not recommended.
- Warm iron if needed.
- Instructions are always available on the shop's website.

Machine washing

Although the paint is permanent according to the manufacturer, the friction from repeated washes in a machine may eventually cause some areas to rub off. I continue to try to improve the sturdiness of the products, and use my own pieces for ongoing testing. So, I recommend only spot-cleaning with mild soap and cool water.
